I am certainly in agreement with Carl Malamud and Public.Resource.org that the entirety of American law should be freely available to the public. Making it available online allows low cost, wide-spread distribution to anyone who needs or wants to review these standards (non-computer owners could have free, full access at public libraries). It seems painfully obvious that Americans shouldn't have to pay to know the laws with which they must comply.

The U.S. Court of Appeals' Justice Stephen Breyer was correct in the Veeck case, saying that there is a "continuous understanding that 'the law,' whether articulated in judicial opinions or legislative acts or ordinances, is in the public domain and thus not amenable to copyright." • *Veeck v. Southern Building Code Congress*, 293 F.3d 791 (5th Circuit, 2002).

Please make sure this is upheld and parties supporting free distribution are commended for their outstanding democratic efforts. Thank you for your consideration.

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
