

First and foremost, I am far from a policy expert, just an opinionated citizen. That said,

1) I feel that reasonably available means that material should be available for free, to anyone who requests it, and should be available both online and in a printed form (for which the first copy could be free, and subsequent copies would require a fee to defray printing and distribution costs).

2) Class of persons affected includes any person, citizen or not, who is interested in reviewing the material.

3) Making this information available online should be the financial responsibility of the agencies affected.

4) The process of scanning a document, converting it to a universal format (e.g. PDF), and uploading it to a server is not overly time intensive or laborious, and could easily be done by a handful of people within a few days.

6) The OFR should possess the power to either reject IBR if it is not available for free online or require that the relevant government agency post the material online.

8) Whichever agency is most capable of handling the enforcement and possible hosting of the material should be given control of this issue. Seeing as the OFR website is very user friendly and open, I would feel comfortable having the OFR host the material at the very least.

9) An extended review period may affect businesses whose revenue source is closely affected by the IBR, and care should be taken not to take enough time to negatively affect those businesses.
