Re: Federal Participation in the Development and Use of Voluntary Consensus Standards and in Conformity Assessment Activities, Docket No. OMB 2012-7602/2012-0003

Dear Administrator Sunstein:

The American Chemistry Council (ACC)¹ appreciates the opportunity to respond to the Office of Management and Budget's request for information regarding *Federal Participation in the Development and Use of Voluntary Consensus Standards and in Conformity Assessment Activities* (77 FR 19357; March 30, 2012). We note that ACC has also separately submitted comments with respect to the Office of the Federal Register's request for comments regarding Incorporation by Reference of standards (77 FR 11414; February 27, 2012).

ACC represents the country's leading producers of chemicals and plastics, the raw materials used to manufacture the vast range of products that make modern life possible. Our organization and membership are touched by voluntary consensus standard development in a number of ways, from material specifications to safety standards. For example, ACC serves as the Secretariat for ANSI Z400.1/Z129.1-2010, the standard for Hazard Evaluation and Safety Data Sheet and Precautionary Labeling Preparation.

It is our view that, to the extent federal regulations recognize private standards, OMB should amend Circular A-119 to establish a preference for consensus standards over non-consensus standards, except in limited circumstances. The Circular should provide supplemental, specific guidance with respect to the definition of consensus standard, the definition of a technical standard, the federal government's process for when and how consensus standards should be preferred to non-consensus standards and guidance with respect to whether and when federal agency employees may or should participate in the development of non-consensus standards.
