I run a small nonprofit called Public.Resource that helps make the law more accessible. I was hoping you could help me with a research question on Georgia law.

I was told that a bill was introduced, perhaps in the last legislative session, that would make the Official Code of Georgia Annotated free of copyright. The Assembly's web site unfortunately is not very helpful in searching for this bill (every bill mentions the OCGA). Might you have any suggestions as to how I might find this?

As you may have read, we're involved in a dispute with the state over the posting of the OCGA.
