1 JUSTICE BIVINS: Good afternoon and  
2 welcome to this 2010 [sic] meeting of the Tennessee  
3 Code Commission. Thank you to the members and everyone  
4 else here that's present participating in the meeting.  
5 we also welcome any of you who are watching on our --  
6 through our YouTube connection.

7 As we have done as our -- in our  
8 court -- as I know many of you have done in your  
9 business world and private practices -- as a result of  
10 the COVID pandemic, we have been conducting a lot of  
11 business via video conferencing and through this Zoom  
12 platform. It's -- we've found that it is an efficient  
13 way to continue to conduct -- to conduct business, and  
14 in this instance, state business, and to make sure that  
15 we can continue to move things forward.

16 we also are pleased to say that we have  
17 been able to live stream these events so that there can  
18 continue to be public access to these meetings. And so  
19 anyone who wishes to do so can watch them through the  
20 live stream connection on our YouTube channel. So we  
21 welcome those are who here.

22 with that being said, I will call the  
23 meeting of the Tennessee Code Commission for 2020  
24 together and convene it. We will begin with our  
25 agenda, the agenda. The first item on the agenda is

1 approval of the minutes from the November 12, 2019,  
2 meeting. So I think all of the members have been  
3 furnished a copy of the minutes prior to the meeting.  
4 Are there any changes, additions, revisions, or do I  
5 hear a motion to approve?

6 JUSTICE CLARK: This is Justice Clark.  
7 I move to approve.

8 JUSTICE BIVINS: Thank you. Is there a  
9 second?

10 JUSTICE SHORT JONES: This is Justice  
11 Short Jones. I second.

12 JUSTICE BIVINS: Thank you. All right.  
13 Any discussion on the minutes?

14 JUSTICE SLATERY: Judge Bivins, this is  
15 not on the minutes, but it is on the transcript. I  
16 don't know whether this is the proper place to raise  
17 it. But on page 29 of the transcript, they've got me  
18 voting aye when I probably said nay or no. And I  
19 believe it needs to be corrected to line up with the  
20 minutes, to be honest.

21 JUSTICE BIVINS: That's a very good  
22 point. Yeah. All right. We will note that for the  
23 record that -- it was page 29, did you say, General?

24 JUSTICE SLATERY: 29, yes, sir.

25 JUSTICE BIVINS: Okay.

1 JUSTICE CLARK: And, General, this is  
2 Connie Clark, and I'm looking at that page, and it --  
3 if you look at the whole thing, it looks like that the  
4 Chief Justice first called for the ayes, and then he  
5 said opposed, and you answered aye. So if it's a like  
6 sign thing, that may be the right answer. But you are  
7 right; you were -- you were voting under the no's.

8 JUSTICE BIVINS: And that could well  
9 be. We probably ought to go ahead and correct it just  
10 so it's --

11 JUSTICE CLARK: Yeah.

12 JUSTICE BIVINS: -- clear. So for  
13 purposes of the record, let it reflect that the  
14 transcript at page 29 should reflect that General  
15 Slatery did vote against the motion at issue at that  
16 point. That is -- and that is consistent with the  
17 minutes.

18 So with that notation, are there any  
19 other comments about the minutes?

20 (No verbal response.)

21 JUSTICE BIVINS: All right. Seeing  
22 none, we'll proceed to a vote.

23 All of those in favor, please, say  
24 "aye."

25 JUSTICE CLARK: Aye.

1 JUSTICE SHORT JONES: Aye.

2 JUSTICE SLATERY: Aye.

3 JUSTICE BIVINS: Opposed, "no."

4 (No verbal response.)

5 JUSTICE BIVINS: All right. It passed  
6 unanimately.

7 All right. The second item on the  
8 agenda is the discussion of proposals for the 2020  
9 T.C.A. volume replacements. Is Leslie going to handle  
10 that? Who is going to handle that?

11 MS. METHENEY: Paige, do you want me to  
12 handle it, or do you want to handle that?

13 MS. SEALS: You can go ahead, Leslie.

14 MS. METHENEY: Okay. And maybe  
15 Mr. Chief Justice, I can start, and if Paige needs to  
16 add in, we can do that.

17 JUSTICE BIVINS: That's totally fine.

18 MS. METHENEY: Okay. First thing, I  
19 have to apologize. There is a typo on the chart that I  
20 sent to all of you, and it is on the column marked  
21 "Supp Pages." It says "2019 Supplement Pages." That  
22 is actually the 2020 supplement pages. So that is the  
23 number of pages that the supplements have this year.

24 JUSTICE BIVINS: Okay. So is it -- I  
25 think you're talking about the heading for the column



1 there; correct?

2 MS. METHENEY: The heading for the  
3 column is incorrect. The numbers are correct within  
4 the column, but the heading for the column is  
5 incorrect.

6 JUSTICE BIVINS: Okay. So for purposes  
7 of those recording the minutes, Leslie is referring to  
8 what is currently labeled as the "2019 Supp," S-U-P-P,  
9 "Pages." There's a column listing the supp pages for  
10 all of the volumes that follow; that heading should be  
11 corrected to read 2020 Supp Pages; correct, Leslie?

12 MS. METHENEY: That is correct.

13 JUSTICE BIVINS: All right.

14 MS. METHENEY: So, for example, for the  
15 first, Volume 2A, State Government, it is correct that  
16 the supp this year would have 312 pages in it.

17 JUSTICE BIVINS: All right. Thank you.

18 MS. METHENEY: First off, I want to  
19 thank you again for renewing the contract with us and  
20 entrusting us with this partnership. We really  
21 appreciate it and believe me, it has been -- as 2020  
22 has been a difficult year for everyone, it has been a  
23 difficult year in the publishing business, and Paige  
24 and her team and the editorial team at Lexis have  
25 really had to work through lots of adversity to get us

1 published. And we particularly appreciate what Paige  
2 and her team have done. So kudos to them and many  
3 thanks for all of their hard work.

4 And in the tradition that we have  
5 established, the procedure that we go about in order to  
6 pick replacement volumes is that we take the data that  
7 Lexis has, and we provide the raw data to Paige. We  
8 have our legal analyst look at it and make some  
9 preliminary decisions on what we think makes most sense  
10 from our perspective on what should be replaced as an  
11 RV. And the reason that we replace RVs on a regular  
12 basis is unless you're going to do a complete  
13 recodification on -- you know, every ten years or every  
14 so often, you have to do the replacement volumes to  
15 keep the code in good condition and not have all of  
16 these standalone supplements and things so fraught with  
17 pages that it is just not a viable entity for a  
18 practitioner to deal with.

19 So we hand this material over to Paige.  
20 We make our recommendations, but we always know that  
21 Paige, as the person on the ground in Tennessee, is  
22 going to have a better picture of what's going on in  
23 the legislature and what's going on with her people in  
24 the next year to guide us in what decision should be  
25 made. So we go through, we have a discussion, and go

1 back and forth. So what we originally recommend may  
2 not at all be what we end up deciding, but we do it  
3 together and come to a conclusion.

4 So the conclusion we came to this year  
5 was that the volumes that should be replaced are volume  
6 2A, State Government, which would have a 312-page  
7 supplement if it was to be published that way.

8 volume 4, Courts and Procedure, which  
9 has not been done since 2009 and really needs to be  
10 updated. It would have 292-page supplement. And  
11 basically between 300 and 320 pages is where a  
12 supplement becomes a standalone supplement.

13 The next one we decided on is volume 6.  
14 Probate, Mental Health, Guardianship and Fiduciaries  
15 and Trust Estates. It is a big volume. It is very  
16 awkward. Practitioners don't like that, and we finally  
17 decided we had to do something about it because when  
18 you look at the fact that the volume is 1,282 pages  
19 long and, then, yes, the supplement is not as big as  
20 some of the others, but it's 172 pages. So when you  
21 put the two together, it's really awkward.

22 So we decided it was time for a split.  
23 The split will occur after mental health. So probate  
24 and mental health will be together, and then  
25 guardianship and fiduciaries and trust estates will be

1 together. So that will be two volumes. That will be  
2 6, 6A, and then what is currently 6A, Domestic  
3 Relations, which does have a standalone supplement will  
4 become 6B. So those are the volumes that we recommend  
5 this year.

6 Justice Clark, did you have a question?

7 JUSTICE CLARK: Yeah, I had a question  
8 about that. Volume 6A has to become 6B, and Volume 6B,  
9 Juveniles, has to become 6C. Otherwise, you're getting  
10 Title 37 and Title 38 out of order with each other;  
11 isn't that what you really mean?

12 MS. METHENEY: Paige, do you want to  
13 rescue me?

14 MS. SEALS: Yes. And I just noticed  
15 that, so I typed it wrong on my email, but Justice  
16 Clark is right. So 6A would become -- the existing 6A  
17 would become 6B, and we would just have the sticker on  
18 the existing 6B to become 6C.

19 THE CLERK: Thank you.

20 MS. SEALS: Yes. And I apologize. I  
21 did not notice that sooner, but I noticed it this  
22 morning and had a note to mention that myself. So  
23 thank you, Justice Clark.

24 MS. METHENEY: Thank you.

25 JUSTICE BIVINS: Leslie, do you have an

1 approximation as to how many pages on 6 -- 6 and 6B  
2 will be when you split those up that way?

3 MS. METHENEY: I do not at this time.

4 JUSTICE BIVINS: Okay. That's fine. I  
5 was just trying to get an idea.

6 MS. METHENEY: Yeah. You can -- I know  
7 that the legal analysts took a look and tried to make  
8 the split at the spot that made the most sense to make  
9 it the most equitable.

10 JUSTICE BIVINS: Okay.

11 MS. METHENEY: That at the same time  
12 made the most sense as far as material.

13 JUSTICE BIVINS: All right. Go ahead.

14 MS. METHENEY: That's really what --  
15 what I have to say.

16 Paige, do you have anything to add into  
17 that.

18 MS. SEALS: No, not really. Just as  
19 you can see that I decided to kick 11B, I think it is,  
20 the tax volume one more year just to see what happens  
21 with Streamlined Sales Tax going on. We're also  
22 anticipating that there will be a big change with that,  
23 and it may be next year will just be the year we do it  
24 no matter what. We'll see what this year has in store.

25 And, Justice Bivins, that's a good

1 question on the split. I was scrolling through my  
2 email, and I just can't come across it. But Caroline  
3 and I -- Caroline from Lexis and I did have a  
4 conversation about the split and my concern that it  
5 would make one volume too small. But we --

6 JUSTICE BIVINS: Yeah, that's what I  
7 was asking.

8 MS. SEALS: But the page count we came  
9 up with worked.

10 JUSTICE BIVINS: Okay.

11 MS. SEALS: But if I find that, I will  
12 forward that information.

13 JUSTICE BIVINS: That's fine. I  
14 think -- as long as you guys have looked at it and  
15 you're comfortable that there it -- that there will be  
16 an equitable split as far as pages go. And, I mean,  
17 obviously, it can't be an equal split because you have  
18 to stick with subject matter.

19 MS. SEALS: Right. Right. No. Yes.  
20 It was something we did take into consideration.

21 JUSTICE BIVINS: All right.

22 All right. Questions for Leslie or  
23 Paige from the members?

24 (No verbal response.)

25 JUSTICE BIVINS: All right. Do I hear

1 a motion?

2 JUSTICE SHORT JONES: I move --

3 JUSTICE CLARK: I move approval of the  
4 recommendation -- or Susan can move; I'll second. So  
5 second.

6 JUSTICE SHORT JONES: Thank you. I'll  
7 move.

8 JUSTICE BIVINS: Okay. Ms. Short Jones  
9 moves for approval of the replacement volumes as  
10 proposed. Justice Clark seconds.

11 Is there further discussion?

12 (No verbal response.)

13 JUSTICE BIVINS: Seeing none, we'll  
14 proceed to a vote. All of those in favor of the  
15 motion, please, signify by saying "aye."

16 JUSTICE CLARK: Aye.

17 JUSTICE SHORT JONES: Aye.

18 JUSTICE BIVINS: Aye.

19 JUSTICE SLATERY: Aye.

20 JUSTICE BIVINS: All of those opposed  
21 please say "no."

22 (No verbal response.)

23 JUSTICE BIVINS: All right. Let the  
24 record reflect that the motion passes unanimously.

25 All right. And then is there any new

1 business otherwise to come before the commission today  
2 other than setting -- well, I know we have to set the  
3 date for the next meeting.

4 (No verbal response.)

5 JUSTICE BIVINS: All right. I see  
6 none. Setting the date for the next meeting, it looks  
7 like in looking at the calendar that if we continue to  
8 meet on the second Tuesday of November for 2021, that  
9 would be November the 9th, 2021. So if we think --  
10 unless there is objection, we would plan on setting it  
11 for November the 9th, 2021, at 1:30 P.M. Central  
12 Standard Time.

13 JUSTICE CLARK: Chief, this is Connie  
14 Clark. I will just remind you that according to the  
15 schedule we have set for ourselves, I am scheduled to  
16 be out of state at a conference for about a week during  
17 that time. I have no idea at this moment whether that  
18 will actually take place, and if I can still  
19 participate in this via Zoom, I would be able to do  
20 that. But I -- right now, I'm not scheduled to be in  
21 Nashville on that date.

22 JUSTICE BIVINS: That's -- yeah, I  
23 forgot to consult that, Justice Clark. Hold on a  
24 minute. Let's see. Now, would you be back in town for  
25 the next week?



1 JUSTICE CLARK: Yeah.

2 JUSTICE BIVINS: The 16th.

3 JUSTICE CLARK: Yeah. But I hate to --

4 JUSTICE BIVINS: well, we're this

5 far --

6 JUSTICE CLARK: -- inconvenience

7 everyone else.

8 JUSTICE BIVINS: -- ahead, if there's a  
9 conflict, let's -- does anyone else have a conflict for  
10 November the 16th of next year as opposed to the 9th?

11 JUSTICE SHORT JONES: No conflict.

12 MS. GARRETT: No.

13 JUSTICE BIVINS: All right. Okay.

14 Then let's plan -- I see no objections, so without  
15 objection, we'll set the meeting for November the 16th,  
16 2021, at 1:30 P.M. Central Standard Time with the hopes  
17 of meeting in person at that point in time.

18 All right. Is there further business  
19 to come before the commission today?

20 (No verbal response.)

21 JUSTICE BIVINS: All right. Seeing  
22 none, without objection, the commission meeting for  
23 2020 will stand adjourned. Thank you very much.

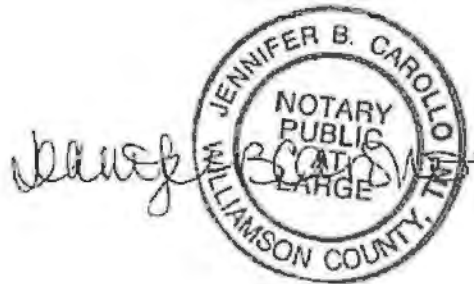
